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one of our deepest needs is for a sense of identity and belonging a common feature in this is human attachment to landscape and how we find identity in landscape and place the late 1980s and early 1990s saw a remarkable flowering of interest in and understanding of cultural landscapes with these came a challenge to the 1960s and 1970s concept of heritage concentrating on great monuments and archaeological locations famous architectural ensembles or historic sites with connections to the rich and famous managing cultural landscapes explores the latest thought in landscape and place by airing critical discussion of key issues in cultural landscapes through accessible accounts of how the concept of cultural landscape applies in diverse contexts across the globe and is inextricably tied to notions of living history where landscape itself is a rich social history record widening the notion that landscape only involves rural settings to embrace historic urban landscapes townscape examining critical issues of identity maintenance of traditional skills and knowledge bases in the face of globalization and new technologies fostering international debate with interdisciplinary appeal to provide a critical text for academics students practitioners and informed community organizations discussing how the cultural landscape concept can be a useful management tool relative to current issues and challenges with contributions from an international group of authors managing cultural

landscapes provides an examination of the management of heritage values of cultural landscapes from australia japan china usa canada thailand indonesia pacific islands india and the philippines it reviews critically the factors behind the removal of dresden and its cultural landscape from world heritage listing and gives an overview of historic urban landscape thinking

this edited book provides a broad collection of current critical reflections on heritage making processes involving landscapes positioning itself at the intersection of landscape and heritage studies featuring an international range of contributions from researchers academics activists and professionals the book aims to bridge the gap between research and practice and to nourish an interdisciplinary debate spanning the fields of geography anthropology landscape and heritage studies planning conservation and ecology it provokes critical enquiry about the challenges between heritage making processes and global issues such as sustainability economic inequalities social cohesion and conflict involving voices and perspectives from different regions of the world case studies in italy portugal spain slovenia the netherlands turkey the uk columbia brazil new zealand and afghanistan highlight different approaches values and models of governance this interdisciplinary book will appeal to researchers academics practitioners and every landscape citizen interested in heritage studies cultural landscapes conservation geography and planning

this book approaches cultural landscape as a driver for societal challenges economic development social inclusion place assessment and heritage conservation it explores issues stemming from the relation between conservation and emergencies and identifies descriptive tools for conveying knowledge and generating new expertise heritage skills seismic culture and social resilience the documentation of landscapes due in part to new technologies increasingly involves integrated methodologies and graphic outcomes such as heritage bim advanced 3d modeling and immersive environments according to recent unesco recommendations the process of mapping places is a necessary prerequisite for design action and also includes the emotional and perceptive dimension so as to represent space through visual thought and produce graphic materials the chapters presented here will ultimately support efforts to overcome the emergency phase of reconstruction after natural disasters and by exploring relevant issues in recent studies will describe emerging tools that can help inspire practices that concern not only agrarian and urban but also historic urban landscapes the work also presents planning tools to help preserve the integrity and authenticity of urban heritages the book will benefit all scholars and practitioners who are involved in the process of understanding designing and transforming places and will foster an international exchange of research case studies and best practices to confront the practical challenges involved in keeping cultural landscapes alive

cultural landscapes which in the field of heritage studies and practice relates to caring for and safeguarding heritage landscapes is a concept embedded in contemporary conservation heritage conservation has shifted from an historical focus on buildings city centres and archaeological sites to encompass progressively more diverse forms of heritage and increasingly larger geographic areas embracing both rural and urban landscapes while the origin of the idea of cultural landscapes can be traced to the late 19th century euro american scholarship it came to global attention after 1992 following its adoption as a category of site by the unesco world heritage committee today cultural landscape practice has become increasingly complex given the expansion of the values and meanings of heritage the influence of environmental challenges such as human induced climate change

technological advancements and the need to better understand and interpret human connections to place and landscapes the aim of this handbook is to strike a balance between theory and practice which we see as inseparable while also seeking to achieve a geographical spread disciplinary diversity and perspectives and a mix of authors from academic practitioner management and community backgrounds

this book has been initiated by the workshop on cultural heritage in changing landscapes held during the iale international association for landscape ecology european conference that started in stockholm sweden in june 2001 and continued across the baltic to tartu estonia in july the papers presented at the workshop have been supported by invited contributions that address a wider range of the cultural heritage management issues and research interfaces required to study cultural landscapes the book focuses on landscape interfaces both the ones we find out there in the landscape and the ones we face while doing research we hope that this book helps if not to make use of these interfaces then at least to map them and bridge some of the gaps between them the editors wish to thank those people helping us to assemble this collection first of all our gratitude goes to the authors who contributed to the book we would like to thank marc antrop mats widgren roland gustavsson marion pots chin barbel tress tiina peil helen soovali and anu printsmann for their quick and helpful advice opinions and comments during the different stages of editing helen soovali and anu printsmann together with piret pungas thank you for technical help

new approaches to both cultural landscapes and historic urban landscapes increasingly recognize the need to guide future change rather than simply protecting the fabric of the past challenging traditional notions of historic preservation conserving cultural landscapes takes a dynamic multifaceted approach to conservation it builds on the premise that a successful approach to urban and cultural landscape conservation recognizes cultural as well as natural values sustains traditional connections to place and engages people in stewardship where they live and work it brings together academics within the humanities and humanistic social sciences conservation and preservation professionals practitioners and stakeholders to rethink the meaning and practice of cultural heritage conservation encourage international cooperation and stimulate collaborative research and scholarship

the cultural landscape past present and future considers different aspects of man's intervention with natural vegetation and the landscape resulting from a long equilibrium of co-existence these landscapes are not stable and the recent and ever accelerating changes in technology and life style have increasingly affected many ancient landscapes as old land use practices are abandoned and traditions forgotten the papers in this book describe and trace the development of cultural landscapes in different climatic and biogeographical regions in europe remnants of traditional land use still remaining are described particularly from western norway where traditions have lingered because the rugged topography of the region is inimicable to high technology each chapter is by an expert in the field the topics cover the documentation of present cultural landscapes their maintenance and restoration and the history of the development of cultural landscapes from the stone age onwards linking the intensity of landscape utilization with population dynamics and technological attainments the disciplines involved include vegetation science vegetation history ecology palaeoecology archaeology sociology geography and history

while historical and protected landscapes have been well studied for years the cultural significance of ordinary landscapes is now increasingly recognised this groundbreaking book discusses how contemporary cultural landscapes can be and are created and recognised the book challenges common concepts of cultural landscapes as protected or special landscapes that include significant buildings or features using case studies from around the world it questions the usual measures of judgement related to cultural landscapes and instead focuses on landscapes that are created planned or simply evolve as a result of changing human cultures management policy and practice each contribution analyses the geographical and human background of the landscape and policies and management strategies that impact upon it and defines the meanings of cultural landscape in its particular context taken together they establish a new paradigm in the study of landscapes in all forms

cultural landscapes are usually understood within physical geography as those transformed by human action as human influence on the earth increases advances in palaeocological reconstruction have also allowed for new interpretations of the evidence for the earliest human impacts on the environment it is essential that such evidence is examined in the context of modern trends in social sciences and humanities this stimulating new book argues that convergence of the two approaches can provide a more holistic understanding of long term physical and human processes split into two major sections this book attempts to bridge the gap between the sciences and humanities the first section provides an analysis of the methodological tools employed in examining processes of environmental change empirical research in the fields of palaeocology and quaternary studies is combined with the latest theoretical views of nature and landscape occurring in cultural geography archaeology and anthropology the author examines the way in which environmental management decisions are made the book then moves on to discuss the relevance of this perspective to contemporary issues through a wide variety of international case studies including world heritage protection landscape preservation indigenous people and cultural tourism

understanding cultural landscapes provides an introduction to the range of approaches characterising the study of landscape and culture this textbook discusses the origins underpinnings and practical applications of social science and humanities scholarship concerning landscape and its theorisation the book offers an easy to digest introduction to relevant approaches and ideas in the study of landscape the text includes practical real world examples drawn from a range of social science and humanities disciplines to showcase the interpretation of landscape by different means and to different ends pauses for thought encourage the reader to reflect and connect ideas and debates to examples encountered in their own life and work suggested activities support independent study and aid the design and delivery of university teaching each chapter also includes suggested readings and the textbook includes discussion of research methods for those developing their own research projects this book will be valuable for both students and educators encountering or teaching the study of landscape within the humanities and social sciences for the first time the incorporation of practical exercises and suggested reading enables the book to supplement independent study or be used as a teaching aid

places are locations of value where psychological and cultural needs are satisfied human relationships with particular environments play a key role in motivating developing and nurturing the life of societies undifferentiated space becomes a place as we understand it better and its built and natural forms become endowed with value however misunderstanding the critical importance of heritage locations particularly based on rejection of

local and regional distinctiveness has often led to their destruction featuring essays from across central europe and beyond and aimed at practitioners decision makers and concerned citizens alike this book raises awareness about the responsibility that we bear for every action taken that modifies the formal and socio cultural context potentially these actions can negatively impact the cultural landscape learning to recognize the essential value of heritage to the place ness of our cities and landscapes is vital in helping us to preserve and enjoy their intrinsic beauty and cultural importance

the conservation and management of cultural landscapes interpreted as the result of the interrelationships among economic social and environmental factors through time and space emerges as essential components in the definition and application of a modern approach to sustainable development cultural landscapes are the result of management practices and knowledge accumulated in human history and contribute not only to the cultural heritage of the world but also to biodiversity and aesthetic beauty providing also multiple goods and services for the development of rural areas however landscapes are severely endangered not only by some effects of the socioeconomic development but also by inappropriate policies in agriculture forestry and nature conservation this interdisciplinary book presents a range of different methods developed to analyse restore and manage cultural landscapes reporting a number of case studies from europe and north america but raising some questions about the need for a revision of some past orientations

since 1972 unesco has been compiling a list of world heritage sites worthy of protection and conservation for the long term written by someone who has been involved with the selection of sites for unesco this book presents a personal insight into the process and what inspires and guides the decision making of its members peter fowler examines the idea of a cultural landscape how it is defined and why some landscapes are important and others less so guiding the reader through some of the cultural landscapes designated as a world heritage site he also reveals some of the politics involved the rivalry between areas seeking protection and the contentious issues that arise including mount athos in greece tikal national park in guatemala kakadu national park in australia the isles of scilly and hadrian s wall it will be a thoroughly interesting and engaging book for anyone interested in the preservation of our cultural heritage worldwide

placemaking and cultural landscapes are worldwide multidisciplinary global concerns that cover many points of view of the common impacts of socio economic cultural and rights jurisprudence planning wellbeing and related advancements concerned with the complex interactions between the development and environment of those factors it is important to seek ways paths and implications for framing sustainability in all social activities this book is mostly based on the 10th acla asian cultural landscape association international webinar symposium that took place during september 26 27 2020 in the banaras hindu university varanasi india it examines contemporary social cultural issues in the context of the united nations sustainable development goals un sdgs and associated cultural and sacred landscapes there the emphasis is on awakening deeper cultural sensitivity in

harmonizing the world and the role of society and spiritual systems drawing upon multi disciplinary and cross cultural interfaces all within the scope of the future of the earth the book s chapters add a new dimension of cultural understanding in the broad domain of emerging human geoscience considered as key policy science for contributing towards sustainability and survivability science together with future earth initiatives

studying cultural landscapes combines a collection of lively and engaging essays covering the symbolic reading of a wide variety of landscapes it offers historical cultural political visual and poetic perspectives offering analyses of landscape forms from the rural to the celluloid essential reading for any student of cultural geography as well as students taking related interdisciplinary subjects who would like to explore the multiple meaning of landscape

this book seeks to enhance the cultural dimension of sustainable development and particularly focuses on minor historic centers and their natural and rural landscapes in a society becoming ever more globalized without territorial restrictions in the production of goods and able to reproduce in china the goods and product characteristic of south american crafts to mention just two extremes the only element that can still be contextualized is heritage identity the result of close integration between cultural assets intangible assets and settled communities thus heritage identity is one of the few elements together with natural resources which has the potential for economic development that is still firmly rooted in places and local populations these towns are often the centerpiece of urban landscapes and geographical areas with original features not always but often as individual places within networks of minor historical centers linked by shared history traditions and or natural elements rivers forests river systems or other natural elements they are outside the major tourist networks even if now there is a budding interest in the touristic exploitation of these environments so they are the right places to pursue a sustainable and local development with a cultural perspective this book is a product of the viva eastpart project valorisation and improving of management of small historic centres in the eastern partnership region under the eu funded enpi eastern partnership program it complements the more practically focused work that is in production from this group more focused on empirical approaches to the development of minor historic centers of the nations involved though the book has been influenced by this research and working experience the authors are solely responsible for the content and opinions presented

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
